Purpose: This program provides the opportunity to teenage students to learn first-hand how a local government operates by participating in simulated town council meetings. The Teen Council will meet once a month on Tuesday during the school year.

This meeting of the Malabar Town Council was held at Town Hall at 2725 Malabar Road.

A. CALL TO ORDER: The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by Chair Briana Mahoney. Prayer and pledge were led by Chair Briana Mahoney.

At this time, Secretary Kelley announced that the week of October 21, 2012 through October 27, 2012 is Florida City Government Week. She asked the Council if anybody's school had anything planned government related during that week.

Kelley gave information about the Candidate Forum and invited all the Teen Council and parents to come out and learn about the candidates that are running for the Mayor's seat and open Council seats.

C. 1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Discussion: None

MOTION: D. Mahoney/Ritter to approve the minutes from September 18, 2012 as presented. VOTE: All Ayes.

D. PUBLIC COMMENTS (NON-AGENDA ITEMS):

Laura Mahoney came forward to question the suggestion of a bike trail in Malabar. Kelley reported that this is being worked on as a work in progress. A representative from the Park Board attends the monthly BPTAC meetings to get bike trails in the area under way.

E. DISCUSSION:

2. AMENDMENT 4 – A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT RELATING TO PROPERTY TAXES

Chair Briana Mahoney read the background information to Council and to the audience. She then opened up to public comments.

Public Comments:

Liz Ritter, 2860 Orange Avenue, came forward and addressed Council. We, in Malabar don't really pay a lot of taxes; it is kept to the minimal point any way. Don't need to cut the taxes. As well as for first-time home buyers, this is also for rental properties, second homes and commercial properties. The income received on these types of properties is needed to provide for the tenants (i.e. maintenance/upkeep of the property. Us as a town, we are not really charging much for taxes.

Discussion: Kelley asked if the Council understood the amendment and what it would mean for a yes/no vote. Ritter explained to the Council his view of the amendment that if passed, it would mean reduced revenues or budget cuts to the local governments.

Attorney Crews asked if there is a motion on the floor. D. Mahoney stated she didn't understand; if it's passed, what's the difference. Ritter stated that if the amendment passes, the people wouldn't have to pay taxes on the full value of the property. The local governments wouldn't be getting as much monies in to provide for the services that the residents are accustomed to and want to have. So basically, the budget would be cut which really wouldn't be helping the economy. Attorney Crews stated this is one time that the government is trying to control behavior or encourage behavior through the legislative process to push for changes in the amendment of the Constitution. Some people think this is great as they are providing special tax breaks. If you look at this amendment, the government is trying to encourage home ownership activities to give tax breaks to first-time homeowners and other tax breaks as well. It may help spur the economy, but on the other hand a lot of people could say that the government should stay out of it. These are some of the arguments that people have but there are other arguments regarding this amendment as well.

Liz Ritter stated that there are, currently, exemptions available. There are still exemptions for first-time homeowners and homestead exemptions. Kelley stated the list goes on and on with the various types of exemptions that are available for those who qualify. This is just something that is being added to the list for additional exemptions; a way to get people interested in purchasing property.

Brain Vail, 2700 Smith Lane, came forward and addressed Council. He doesn't know if it would affect Malabar as much as the surrounding areas; we don't have a lot of property turn over. It will have a trickle down affect. Once properties start selling, you will see the difference. He doesn't see it now affecting our revenues as a town but as things do start to sell, we will see a short-fall. Yes it will encourage people to do more but it will affect the running of the cities/towns.

Attorney Crews stated that this is another argument that Council should discuss. Many people believe that this is not an issue that should be in the Constitution. The legislature should deal with issues like this which they are able to do so why make it a constitutional amendment. It will affect you forever whereas if the legislature makes a change they

can reverse it later when the conditions have changed. Ritter stated that this should be on the Presidential Debate. Several people stated that this is just for Florida; it is not country-wide. Ritter stated that this could come in the future.

C. Mahoney stated that one thing he found that, while reading, it appears that cities were not allowed to collect property taxes until 1885. The Florida State Senate; uniform and equal rate of property taxation was put into the Constitution in 1885. He looked this up and found that this is when the whole Constitution was re-done; the scrapped the old one and completely restarted the process. In 1885, that is when the cities were allowed to start collecting property taxes. There are probably other ways to collect revenue then with just property taxes.

Ritter asked how much of the revenues are from property taxes. Attorney Crews stated that it is 18% in Malabar. But typically, it's closer to 25%. C. Mahoney asked if property taxes are higher than the usual rate allowed. Attorney Crews asked if he was speaking of the assessed value of the property. The Property Appraiser for the County makes those assessments; you could make contact with their office if you felt that your property's assessed value isn't a fair or unreasonable value. They may change it or not.

Chair Briana Mahoney asked if there is a motion. No motion on the floor.

D. Mahoney stated she doesn't fully understand. Basically the motion would affect the homestead exemption. When she first heard it, it was 5% for the first three years if you are a new home owner. But then she heard that it wasn't affecting the homestead. Kelley asked Attorney Crews to explain. He stated that this is a way to reduce the people's tax burden. Ritter stated it is a tax cut and will affect the amount of money that the local government agencies receive. Attorney Crews stated it would be a targeted tax cut. Ritter stated that when people hear tax cut, they will vote for it. The people want more money without knowing what it will affect. C. Mahoney stated he would probably vote no; it creates an unfair tax system. We have all these different people who aren't taxed but people over here are taxed. It should be the same for everyone and make it simple.

Adkins asked if it could harden the economy with all the tax cuts. If you are getting these tax cuts, government workers are going to lose their jobs; there will be less revenue going to the government. Ritter stated it would depend on what you are in; when they do cut something (government), it is usually energy, education, health and the lower spent things than the higher items. Attorney stated that even though you are reducing taxes, it may not mean reduction in revenues. If you have an exemption for first-time home buyers, you may have more first-time home buyers purchasing property, thus creating a healthy economy with contractors building homes. They are making more money and paying more taxes so you end up with more revenue. It's very complex. Brian Vail stated that it is there hope, by encouraging more spending, it will stimulate the economy and people will start spending money and values will go up. It will help get the economy rolling. It will off-set the economy in the future.

Marcie Adkins, 2055 Valkaria Road, came forward and addressed Council. She asked why Council doesn't do a straw vote.

MOTION: D. Mahoney/Ritter to approve Amendment 4.

Attorney Crews gave some insight to Council. Usually when an item is brought before an elected body, it requires a motion first before discussion. Then you are allowed to debate and discuss the issue.

VOTE: All Nays.

Motion failed unanimously.

Attorney Crews stated that if anyone wanted to hear how the members voted, you can call for a roll call vote.



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

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Backyard chicken rules split county

Final hearing,
vote set for Dec. 6

Brevard County's commissioners might have a tough time reaching consensus on what to do about regulating chicken ownership.

Commissioners were all over the map during a discussion at a hearing Tuesday. A final hearing and vote is set for Dec. 6.

Planning and Development Director Robin Sobrino proposed an ordinance letting residents of areas zoned for single-family homes in unincorporated Brevard to have up to four chickens, ducks, pigeons or other fowl, as long as their property is a half-acre or larger. Fowl would have to be in a coop or similar structure; roosters would be banned; and commercial breeding and slaughtering would be prohibited. Currently, there is a one-chicken-per-property limit, except in areas zoned for agriculture, where there is no maximum and roosters are allowed.

Proponents of raising chickens for eggs want less restrictive rules for neighborhoods outside city limits. In August, the commission directed staffers to prepare an amendment to zoning rules for areas zoned for single-family homes.

Commissioner Trudie Infantini said the proposal is still too restrictive, since many lots are smaller than a half-acre. Infantini favored allowing up to four chickens on lots as small as a quarter-acre.

Commission Vice Chairman Andy Anderson suggested the proposal is fine for now and could be made less restrictive later if there are no complaints after it has been in effect for a while.

Commission Chairman Chuck Nelson wants nothing to do with reducing restrictions on chickens.

"I just think this is a terrible idea," he said. "I'm going to have the pleasure of looking across my canal at a chicken coop. Commissioner Infantini, if you want to have chickens on South Beaches, bless your heart. I'd be willing to vote for that. But I don't want it in my district because,

really, I don't think my community believes that that's appropriate."

Nelson is concerned about manure runoff into canals. He would like to exempt his district from a new rule. County Attorney Scott Knox said that wouldn't stand up legally.

Whatever the commission does, more restrictive rules in deed-restricted communities would take precedence.

The issue has come up in recent months at several city and town councils, which have their own rules about chicken raising. Palm Bay resident Julie Sorenson is pushing city officials to allow chickens. She

said changing rules would let families produce their own food.

County commissioners voted 4-1 to move the proposed rule change to a final hearing.

Nelson voted no. Infantini voted to push forward, while noting it can be modified at a final hearing to make it less restrictive.

She said she would ask supporters of backyard chickens to speak up then.

County commissioners decided Thursday night to loosen restrictions on the raising of chickens for their eggs in residential neighborhoods.

They voted 4-1 in favor of an ordinance to allow homeowners to own up to four chickens per half-acre of residentially zoned single-family property in unincorporated areas of the county.

Commissioner Chuck Nelson voted no, maintaining that it was a bad idea, and would result in disputes between neighbors. He said the current rule allowing one chicken per household in residential areas is fine.

"I feel my community doesn't want to see the change we've talked about," Nelson said.

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But other commissioners decided that the change was good, although they modified the proposal put forth by county Planning and Development Department staff to exclude pigeons, ducks and other fowl.

Commissioner Robin Fisher said he drew the line at chickens.

"We're not opening this up to the rest of the fowl world," Fisher said, because, with the other fowl included, "all of a sudden, right now, we're creating a mini-farm."

Under the rules the commission approved, the chickens must be maintained in a coop or similar housing; must be for personal, non-commercial use of the property occupant; and breeding or slaughtering of the chickens is prohibited.

Seven speakers addressed the commission, including Margaret Goude-lock and Toby Napier, a west Cocoa couple, who first proposed liberalizing the chicken rules to the commission in April.

"I'm looking forward to Christmas with chickens this year," Goude-lock said.

But John Schantzen, president of the North Merritt Island Homeowners Association, said he opposed the change. He said, where there are chickens, there will be predators like coyotes, hawks, raccoons and snakes.

Port St. John resident Kevin Sullivan also spoke in opposition, saying chickens would negatively affect property values in residential areas, and should be limited to land zoned for agricultural use.

Commission Chairman Andy Anderson asked whether fellow commissioners wanted to put a cap on the number of chickens allowed. But the three other commissioners who supported the new rule felt comfortable with four chickens per half-acre, with no maximum.

The new ordinance does not affect properties within Brevard's cities and towns, some of which have their own rules. Nor does it override stricter rules in deed-restricted subdivisions.

recreational opportunities; and while the refuge sympathizes with the needs to protect one's property, and does not wish to have any structures at risk, it does not support hard stabilization or armoring.

Commissioner Infantini stated the Archie Carr preserve is adjacent to a homeowner's property in South Melbourne Beach, and inquired if it is possible for that homeowner to transverse the Archie Carr property north of his home to be able to lay additional sand down before he loses his house. Ms. Kenifl stated the refuge has already allowed one homeowner to do that already, so the refuge is willing to work with the County and the homeowners.

Warren Zorzi stated as of 1986 his home has been eliminated from the beach restoration projects; the dunes have been replaced; and inquired when staff speaks of the south area, is it including the unincorporated area. Mr. Brown responded yes, it is specific to the engineered dune that was built originally in 2005 and 2006. Commissioner Infantini stated Mr. Brown is working very hard with his department to try to restore as much of the sand as possible, and then coming up with a long-term plan for the future because something has to be done going forward; and stated there has been discussion of forming a committee to address the issue.

The Board authorized staff to do the following: 1.) Advertise a Request for Bids for restoring and repairing the engineered dunes in the Mid Reach and South Beaches; 2.) Reduce the advertisement period to 10 days; 3.) Obtain voluntary construction access agreements or easements as needed to construct the project; 4.) Submit State and Federal permit applications for the project; 5.) Authorize \$20,000 in funding for preparations of bid documents and permit applications; and 6.) Authorize all necessary budget actions to affect this approval.

ITEM V.C., PUBLIC HEARING, RE: ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 62-1927 AND 62-2108 OF THE ZONING REGULATIONS RELATING TO FARM ANIMALS AND FOWL TO PERMIT BACKYARD CHICKENS AND OTHER FOWL

Margaret Goudebeck stated she and her husband, Toby, brought this initiative to the Board for backyard chickens; they have spent a lot of time with each Commissioner and the Planning and Development Office; everyone has come together to make a clear code; and she is looking forward to Christmas with chickens. She stated what she is looking for is a compromise; and she hopes to stay focused on a positive change. She noted the only thing she would like to add to the Code is that all residential zonings be allowed to have two chickens.

Toby Napier stated there have been some difficulties along the way; it has been very enlightening to go through the process to get to this point; some misconceptions on how government works has been eliminated as part of the process; and stated there has been a lot of good experiences for his family and friends.

Carmen Parise stated she lives on four lots on Glenwood Road in Port St. John, which is right off of Kings Highway; stated chickens are not a way for her to raise money; she has chickens for pure joy, like some people have cats or dogs; and noted she became a vegan this year and lost 40 pounds, so she does not even eat eggs. She stated an old man came up to her fence and climbed up it to see into her backyard and called Code Enforcement on her because she had

chickens; and she lost all her chickens. She stated she hopes the Board approves four chickens per half-acre.

John Shantzen stated he is the President of the North Merritt Island Homeowners Association; it is a very rural community in general; there are plenty of farm animals, including chickens and ducks in the community, but they are not in the smaller enclaves of North Merritt Island, such as Sunset Lakes and the Savannah's; and those people do not want chickens in their neighborhoods. He stated where there are chickens there are predators, such as coyotes, hawks, and snakes; there was a neighbor on North Merritt Island that was shooting the hawks et cetera, on his neighbors property to protect his chickens; and stated he does not want a situation like in Key West where feral chickens take over the town.

Kevin Sullivan stated he is opposed to the proposed ordinance because he believes it will affect the property values; it will create more issues between the neighbors; and opined fowl should be on agriculturally zoned properties only. He stated the Board should open up Satellite Boulevard in Canaveral Groves because all the properties there are zoned reasonably.

Holly Cartier stated she lives on a little over an acre and is allowed four horses on her acre, but only one chicken; she has a degree in animal science, business, and production; and so this is something she knows quite a bit about. She stated when she was young, her parents bought a house in Lake Washington and the reason they bought there was so they could have chickens; and in the early 1980's, the County came through and changed the ordinance. She stated the pesticides and fertilizers that poison the Lagoon are toxic to chickens; and it takes the output of six chickens to equal one medium dog. She stated she understands the no-roosters rule, but inquired what happens when half of the chicks turn out to be roosters; feral chickens are not a problem in Brevard County; and pointed out if chickens are unattended for an hour and a half they will be eaten.

John Kaufmann stated fowls include things like peacocks; peacocks were a big issue in Cape Canaveral recently; and suggested the Board put the discussion on hold until extensive research has been done. He stated instead of spending a lot of money, what the Board should think about it those who are in favor of changing the ordinance should really consider having first-hand knowledge about what having the animals are going to do; for example, the Board should put chickens and other fowl in their yards and their neighbors' yards.


Commissioner Fisher stated when the Board started this discussion it was about chickens and being sympathetic to chicken lovers; but somehow, the word fowl was extended; and the way he understands the ordinance right now is that one can have four chickens, four turkeys, four pigeons, et cetera. He stated it seems the Board is creating a mini farm; at the August 21st meeting, the Board agreed to four chickens, not fowls, per half-acre; and he would want to stick to the commitment the Board made at that time.

Chairman Anderson stated he feels the same way; and the Board can handle that part of the motion now, if it just wants to limit the use to chickens.

The Board directed staff to strike-through the word 'fowl' from the proposed ordinance, and amend the language to reflect only four chickens to be permitted per half-acre of land in unincorporated Brevard County.
